





1.0 MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

I am delighted to share with you all our Annual Report 2022. The report highlights the activities carried out by the foundation with the support of our partners in 2022, and to the glory of God we were able to accomplish much more than the preceding year. The number of patients seen increased by 358%, cataract surgery by 95%, and the number of glasses dispensed by 145% over the preceding year.

Our activities commenced in January at the Jos Custodial

Centre of the Nigerian Correctional Services where free medical and surgical eye care was offered to both inmates and officials of the centre. Our other activities were held in 2 government hospitals, a mission hospital and a private clinic. We were able to organize our first outreach outside Plateau State in April 2022, and this was at the Federal Medical Centre, Keffi in Nasarawa State also in north-central Nigeria. While we are grateful to all our partners, Board of Trustees, and volunteers for all we were able to achieve in 2022, more still needs to be done as we were unable to meet our target for the year.

The majority of those who are blind in sub-Saharan Africa are poor and reside in rural areas where eye care facilities and personnel are almost nonexistent. It is our desire to be able to extend these services to these rural areas in northern Nigeria in 2023. We therefore, look forward to strengthening our existing partnerships in the new year, and also develop new ones. By doing this we believe we will be able to restore sight to many more who are blind from cataract and refractive errors, and also prevent many from going blind, thereby transforming the lives of multitudes. Eradicating blindness and restoring sight reduces poverty, improves the quality of life for individuals and communities, and positively impacts the GDP of nations. The theme for our activities for the year 2023 would therefore be "Restoring Sight, Transforming Lives".

We would be most grateful if you would support us as we strive towards the realization of this vision. For all who have supported us so far, once again I say thank you, and may the good Lord bless you all.

- Training of community health workers









5.1 Nigerian Correctional Service Outreach



Our first activity for the year took place on the 13th of January 2022 at the Nigerian Correctional Service (formerly Known as Nigerian Prison Service), Jos Medium Security Custodial Centre. Eight inmates command had free eye surgery, pterygium surgery. Eye drops glaucoma and other minor eye conditions, and fifty reading glasses distributed to those with presbyopia. Accessing eye care has always been difficult for the inmates as the clinic within the ophthalmologist or optometrist. The inmates and officers were therefore very happy and grateful to the organization for bringing the service to the custodial center.
















olmarg Eyesight Foundation (KEF) partnered with the department of Ophthalmology, Federal Medical Centre, Keffi (FMCK) to provide free cataract surgery to indigent patients at the centre. This was the first outreach organised by the foundation outside Plateau State. The Head of Department of Ophthalmology at the medical centre, Dr. Patricia Musa expressed her gratitude to KEF for collaborating with the hospital, and said she looked forward to more of such programs in the future. She further disclosed that the Dr. Yahaya Baba Adamu-led management of FMCK is always open and ready to partner with committed NGOs in the areas of equipment and manpower to help offer free health care services to indigent patients. Surgeries were performed on the 5th of April, 2022 at the medical centre's main theatre with 19 patients benefiting from the program. Surgery consumables, postoperative medications and sunglasses were all provided free of charge by the foundation. The patients expressed their delight to both the hospital and the foundation for their kind gesture.















The Executive Director of the organization, Prof. Olukorede Adenuga, thanked the Commander for accepting to collaborate with the organization. He said the foundation was desirous of having another program in the hospital before the end of the year. This he said would be a comprehensive program, not just offering cataract surgery but will also include screening for and treatment of glaucoma, distribution of reading glasses, and screening for diabetic retinopathy. Eighteen patients had eye surgery. All surgery consumables and postoperative medications were provided by

the foundation.



free cataract surgery camp took place on May 30, 2022 at the 563 NAF Hospital, Jos. Kolmarg Eyesight

Foundation (KEF) collaborated with the hospital to provide free cataract surgery to indigent patients. While receiving the eye care team from KEF, the hospital commander, Air Commodore Ogbodo expressed his gratitude to the foundation for choosing the hospital for the laudable program. He noted that there was a lot of poverty in the country with people unable to afford basic health care and that programs such as this will go a long way in alleviating the sufferings of the poor, particularly for those who are blind. He said he hoped the foundation will organize more of such programs in the future and that the hospital will always be ready to

support whenever the need arises.











September, 2022. There was a huge

turnout of people for the one day event. 548 patients were seen, and 225 reading glasses as well as eye drops for other common eye conditions were dispensed. 57 patients had eye surgery, 53 of these were for cataracts with the remaining being pterygium excision. About 40 patients with cataracts, were unable to be operated on initially but later had their surgery, following additional support from our partners

5.5 Dilimi Eye Camp







ur final program for the year, a cataract surgery camp, took place on the 1st of December, 2022 at Ash Shakirun Clinic in Dilimi, Jos. Dilimi is a predominantly Muslim and Hausa community in Jos North local government. Screening began on the 28th of November and 550 patients were seen. Treatment was provided for patients with glaucoma, allergic conjunctivitis, and other common eye conditions, and reading glasses dispensed to those with presbyopia. 69 patients had eye surgery, 62 of these were provided free of charge by the foundation and Ash Shakirun Clinic. Surgeries were sponsored by Advantrix Designs Company Ltd and friends while reading glasses were supplied by Ash Shakirun Clinic.



220 eye surgeries were performed in 2022. Females constituted 112 (51%) of these. The age range of these patients was 10-91 years. 194 cataract surgeries were performed constituting 88% of the surgeries done. Other surgeries performed were pterygium excision (20), secondary intraocular lens implantation (2), trabeculectomy (1), sphincterotomy (1), and bilamellar tarsal rotation (BTR) [2].

These may include any of the following;

- a. Equipment such as operating microscope, cataract surgery set, bipolar cautery machine, hot air oven, direct ophthalmoscope, indirect ophthalmoscope, visual acuity charts, glucometer, and digital sphygmomanometer.
- b. Surgery consumables e.g. posterior chamber intraocular lenses (+19.0D-21.5D), crescent knives, keratomes, viscoelastic, sutures (9/0 nylon, 8/0 vicryl, 4/0 silk), surgical mask, gauze roll, cotton wool roll, and surgical gloves (sizes 7-8).
- c. Drugs e.g. lidnocaine injection, dilating eye drops (Phenylephrine, Tropicamide, Cyclopentolate), Anaesthetic (Tetracaine) eye drops, steroid/antibiotic eye drops and ointment, antiglaucoma eye drops, ciprofloxacin eye drops, antihistamine eye drops, acetazolamide tablets, and tetracycline eye ointment.
- d. Vehicles; the foundation needs a pickup truck (Toyota hilux) and a bus to ease the movement of equipment, consumables, and volunteers to the rural areas where camps will be held.
